CAMPUSES

MACON — Mercer's Macon campus is home to the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, School of Medicine, School of Engineering, School of Business, College of Education and School of Music, along with programs of the College of Professional Advancement and the College of Health Professions. The School of Law is located one mile away on Coleman Hill overlooking downtown. Macon-Bibb County is home to more than 150,000 residents and serves as the educational, medical, cultural and commercial hub of Central Georgia.

ATLANTA — Mercer's Cecil B. Day Graduate and Professional Campus is home to the College of Pharmacy, College of Health Professions, School of Theology, College of

Nursing and the College of Professional Advancement, along with programs of the School of Business, College of Education and the English Language Institute.

SAVANNAH — Savannah is home to a campus of Mercer’s four-year M.D. program in the School of Medicine.

REGIONAL ACADEMIC CENTERS — Mercer offers undergraduate and graduate degree programs for adults at centers in Douglas County and Henry County.

COLUMBUS — The School of Medicine in 2012 opened a clinical site in Columbus for third- and fourth-year students. In 2021, it will expand to a full four-year campus of the medical school.



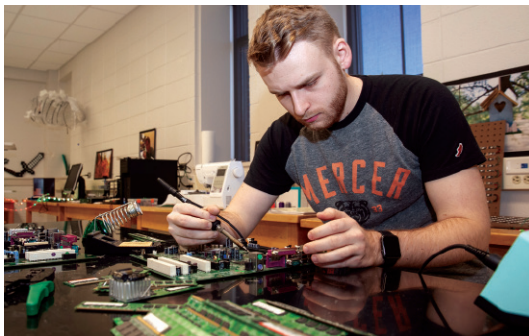

■ College of Liberal Arts and Sciences

MACON — The oldest and largest of the University's academic units, the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences is Mercer's academic cornerstone. The College offers baccalaureate programs in the humanities, fine arts, natural sciences, social sciences, mathematics and computer sciences, along with a variety of interdisciplinary options. Offering a multitude of pre-professional programs in health, law and theology, the College also provides students a strong liberal arts foundation. The core curriculum blends practical skills, such as critical thinking, clear writing and effective communication, along with a deep engagement with the diversity and richness of the peoples, faiths, cultures and natural processes in the world. The College's Great Books Program, which provides students the opportunity for focused study of classic writers and thinkers of the Western world, is recognized among the 21 Best Great Books Programs by Best College Reviews. The Integrative Program combines traditional disciplinary course requirements with three multidisciplinary integrative courses, which require students to wrestle with challenging questions from multiple perspectives and prepare them to make meaningful contributions in a complicated and deeply interconnected world. Students in the College take advantage of a variety of study-abroad opportunities, both through faculty-led programs and those organized through the Mercer On Mission program. In 2015, Mercer was awarded a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's most prestigious academic honor society.

DEGREES OFFERED — Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Science in Health Science.



■ School of Law

MACON — Founded in 1873, Mercer University School of Law is one of the oldest law schools in the United States and the first in the state of Georgia accredited by the



American Bar Association. Mercer Law School’s educational philosophy is based on a commitment to preparing students for high-quality, general practice in a day-to-day learning environment that is both supportive and professional. Mercer Law School is a two-time recipient of the prestigious ABA Gambrell Professionalism Award for excellence and innovation in ethics and professionalism throughout the curriculum. With an enrollment of approximately 390 students, taught by an outstanding faculty, Mercer Law School is nationally recognized for its programs in legal writing, advocacy training, experiential education and ethics and professionalism.

DEGREES OFFERED — Juris Doctor and Juris Doctor/Master of Business Administration (joint degree).

■ School of Business

MACON, ATLANTA, HENRY COUNTY AND ONLINE — Established in 1984, Mercer’s Stetson-Hatcher School of Business is named for Eugene W. Stetson, a 1901 Mercer graduate and business pioneer who leveraged the first major buyout in corporate history, and his grandson Robert F. (Bob) Hatcher, a Macon businessman, longtime supporter, Life Trustee and former board chair for the University. Over the past 80 years, Mercer has granted more than 12,000 business degrees, and many of its graduates hold senior leadership positions in companies around the world. Mercer’s business school delivers career-focused business education in order to develop innovative leaders who are responsible global citizens.

Stetson-Hatcher School of Business is an accredited member of AACSB International — The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business — which places it among the top five percent of business schools worldwide. Mercer’s business school has been recognized as one of the “Best Business Schools” in the United States by both The Princeton Review and *U.S. News & World Report*. It has been recognized among MBA Programs Where Grads Make More Money Than They Owe.

The Evening MBA was included among the top 200 MBA programs in the country, and the Online MBA was ranked among the top 100 Online MBA programs nationwide by *U.S. News & World Report*.

DEGREES OFFERED — Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Arts, Master of Business Administration, Health Care MBA, Innovation MBA, Master of Accountancy and Master of Science in Business Analytics. Students may also combine the MBA with the School's Master of Accountancy or with the University's Doctor of Pharmacy, Doctor of Physical Therapy, Juris Doctor or Master of Divinity.

■ School of Engineering

MACON AND ONLINE — Mercer's innovative and academically challenging engineering and engineering-related programs provide students with a comprehensive education, featuring a solid foundation in mathematics and sciences, a core engineering curriculum, a range of courses in engineering specialties and a strong emphasis on communication methodologies and technologies. The School of Engineering marked its 30th anniversary in 2015, and its undergraduate program is consistently ranked among the top programs in the nation by *U.S. News & World Report*. Known for its breadth of instruction in its undergraduate program and its 4 + 1 integrated bachelor's and master's degree program, Mercer combines technical education with hands-on laboratory experience, research and real-world problem-solving. The School has produced 12 Goldwater Scholars in the last eight years — including an unprecedented three recipients in both 2019 and 2020 — and eight Department of Defense SMART Scholars in the last six years.

DEGREES OFFERED — Bachelor of Science in Engineering with specialties in biomedical, civil, computer, electrical, environmental, industrial and mechanical engineering; Bachelor of Science with majors in industrial management and technical communication; Master of Science in Engineering with specialties in biomedical, civil, computer,



electrical, engineering management, environmental, mechanical and software; Master of Science in cybersecurity, environmental systems, software systems, technical communication management and technical management.

■ College of Education

MACON, ATLANTA, DOUGLAS COUNTY, HENRY COUNTY AND ONLINE — Mercer’s Tift College of Education prepares more professional educators than any other private institution in Georgia. It offers baccalaureate and graduate degrees for teacher education, including initial certification and teacher advancement, and educational leadership. Tift College of Education offers programs approved by the Georgia Professional Standards Commission. Guided by the conceptual framework of “The Transforming Educator,” the College supports those who aspire to grow professionally throughout their careers, while also seeking to transform the lives of students. In addition, the College offers some fully online and blended graduate-level programs.

DEGREES OFFERED — Bachelor of Science in Education, Master of Arts in Teaching, Master of Education and Specialist in Education, and Doctor of Philosophy. Post-baccalaureate non-degree teacher certification coursework and endorsement programs are also offered. The College also provides programs leading to teacher certification for students enrolled in the University’s College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and Townsend School of Music.

■ School of Theology

ATLANTA AND ONLINE — Established in 1996, Mercer’s James and Carolyn McAfee School of Theology brings Jesse Mercer’s founding vision of providing students with a classical and theological education full circle as it prepares students for ministry in the church and beyond. McAfee shares Jesse Mercer’s concern that churches have pastor-leaders who understand Scripture and can clearly articulate their Christian beliefs. The mission is to prepare ministers who will inspire the Church and the world to imagine, discover and create God’s future. The School offers master’s and doctoral degrees, along with several ministry concentrations. The innovative, fully-integrated curriculum is taught by nationally recognized scholars who are committed Christians. Along with a network of partner churches, McAfee is affiliated with the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship.

DEGREES OFFERED — Master of Arts in Christian Ministry, Master of Divinity, Master of Theological Studies and Doctor of Ministry; combined degrees: Master of Divinity/Master of Business Administration, Master of Divinity/Master of Science in Clinical Mental Health Counseling, Master of Divinity/Master of Science in Organizational Leadership (nonprofit), Master of Arts in Christian Ministry/Master of

Science in Organizational Leadership (nonprofit) and Master of Theological Studies/Master of Science in Clinical Mental Health Counseling.

■ College of Professional Advancement

MACON, ATLANTA, DOUGLAS COUNTY, HENRY COUNTY AND ONLINE — Mercer University's College of Professional Advancement is committed to offering undergraduate, graduate and certificate programs, along with lifelong learning opportunities, for adults who seek leadership roles in their community and beyond, professional transition and advancement, and lives that have meaning and purpose. Educational programs support the needs of statistical high-growth and high-demand employment sectors and provide students with a distinctive, multidisciplinary curriculum that integrates theory and practice. Areas of study include counseling and human services, health care, leadership and administration, liberal arts, public safety and technology.

DEGREES OFFERED — Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy. Students may combine the M.S. in Clinical Mental Health Counseling with the University's Master of Divinity or Master of Theological Studies. Students may combine the M.S. in Organizational Leadership with the University's Master of Arts in Christian Ministry or Master of Divinity.



■ School of Music

MACON — Mercer's Townsend School of Music is nationally recognized for its artist faculty, award-winning students, wide range of performance ensembles and state-of-the-art facilities. Townsend offers a thorough and rigorous curriculum, providing a conservatory-quality music education within a university environment. Students benefit from small class sizes and individual instruction from faculty who regularly perform on campus and at major national and

international venues. Specialized music programs include the Robert McDuffie Center for Strings and the Townsend-McAfee Institute for Graduate Church Music Studies.

DEGREES OFFERED — Bachelor of Music in Performance, Bachelor of Music Education, Bachelor of Music with Elective Studies in an Outside Field, Bachelor of Arts in Music, Master of Music in Church Music, Master of Music in Conducting, Master of Music in Performance and Master of Music in Collaborative Piano (vocal or instrumental).

■ Mercer Health Sciences Center

The Mercer Health Sciences Center, a multi-campus academic health center, encompasses the School of Medicine, College of Pharmacy, College of Nursing and College of Health Professions. The Health Sciences Center enrolls more than 2,000

students, employs 400 full-time faculty and staff



and annually graduates more than 500 physicians, nurses and nurse educators, as well as family nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, physician assistants, pharmacists, physical therapists, family therapists, athletic trainers, clinical psychologists, public health professionals and biomedical scientists.

■ School of Medicine

MACON, SAVANNAH AND COLUMBUS — Mercer’s School of Medicine was established in 1982 to educate physicians and health professionals to meet the primary care and healthcare needs of rural and medically underserved areas of Georgia through education, service, research and collaboration. Today, a majority of graduates practice in the state of Georgia, and Mercer is a leader in the nation for those who are practicing in rural or medically underserved areas. The School’s educational environment is founded on a patient-based learning philosophy that is case-driven and provides early patient care experiences. This innovative, hands-on approach results in better long-term retention of content and prepares students for a variety of clinical challenges. With multiple locations throughout Central Georgia, Mercer University School of Medicine offers a campus environment for every type of student. The Macon campus was established in 1982. The Savannah campus was established in 2008 and is located on the hospital campus of Memorial University Medical Center. The Columbus campus began in 2012 and offers clinical education for third- and fourth-year students, with a four-year campus to be completed in late 2021 or early 2022.

DEGREES OFFERED — Doctor of Medicine (Macon, Savannah and Columbus), Master of Family Therapy (Macon and Atlanta), Master of Science in Biomedical Sciences

(Macon and Savannah), Master of Science in Preclinical Sciences (Macon) and a Ph.D. in Rural Health Sciences (Macon).

College of Pharmacy

ATLANTA — The College of Pharmacy advances health through innovations in teaching research, patient-centered care and service. Mercer is ranked the No. 1 private pharmacy school in the Southeast by *U.S. News & World Report*. With an enrollment of more than 500 students and a distinguished faculty of scientists and clinicians, the College houses several centers focusing on research, teaching and learning. The College's motto, "A Tradition of Excellence, a Legacy of Caring," frames its philosophy of providing excellent academic programs in an environment where every student matters and every person counts.

DEGREES OFFERED — Doctor of Pharmacy, Doctor of Philosophy in Pharmaceutical Sciences, Master of Science in Health Outcomes and Master of Science in Pharmaceutical Sciences.



College of Nursing

ATLANTA — Mercer's nationally recognized Georgia Baptist College of Nursing is the longest established nursing program in Georgia. With a rich history dating back to 1902 and more than 8,200 alumni, the College is grounded in the heritage of excellence in nursing education. The College strives to advance the nursing workforce through multiple degree options, and faculty are devoted to academic excellence through a student-centered approach to learning. Nursing faculty are dedicated to the development of professional nurses committed to scholarship, leadership, practice, research and service within a culture of academic excellence.

DEGREES OFFERED — Bachelor of Science in Nursing (Three tracks: traditional track, second degree accelerated and RN-BSN completion track), Master of Science in Nursing (Family Nurse Practitioner and Adult Gerontology Acute Care



Nurse Practitioner), Post-Master’s Doctor of Nursing Practice, and Doctor of Philosophy in nursing. Undergraduate students have the opportunity to complete general education and prerequisite requirements through Mercer’s College of Liberal Arts and Sciences or College of Professional Advancement, as well as other accredited institutions.

College of Health Professions

The College of Health Professions is composed of five disciplines: physical therapy, physician assistant studies, public health, clinical psychology and athletic training. In addition to its degree offerings, the College offers post-professional residencies and fellowships and operates an onsite physical therapy clinic. With an overall enrollment of more than 600 students, the College seeks to improve the health and quality of life of individuals and society through excellence in teaching, research and service.

DEGREES OFFERED — Bachelor of Science in Public Health (Macon), Master of Athletic Training (Macon), Master of Medical Science in Physician Assistant Studies (Atlanta), Master of Public Health (Atlanta, online), Doctor of Physical Therapy (Atlanta) and Doctor of Psychology (Atlanta); combined degrees in Doctor of Pharmacy/Master of Public Health, Doctor of Physical Therapy/Master of Business Administration, Doctor of Physical Therapy/Master of Public Health, Master of Medical Science/Master of Public Health and Doctor of Psychology/Master of Public Health.

Mercer University Libraries

The Mercer University Libraries seek to embody a patron-driven philosophy by practicing excellent customer service, making available learning-centered gateways of information resources, by offering robust collections in support of the academic mission of the Mercer University community, and by utilizing patron-driven materials acquisition models. The libraries provide a wide range of print materials and cloud-

based resources such as eBooks, eJournals, streaming media, research guides and how-to videos.

In addition, the libraries participate in the campus academic enterprise through virtual reference services, group information literacy sessions, one-on-one reference tutorials, and the availability of cloud-based reference tools designed for 24/7 access to online tutorials and electronic resources.

The various library facilities contain multiple learning environments designed for mixed study scenarios, including comfortable spaces for group gatherings, quiet areas for individual work and private group study rooms for collaborative projects. The Swilley and Tarver libraries offer Bear card-accessible 24/7 spaces.

■ Tift College Scholars

Mercer has partnered with the Tift College Alumnae Association to preserve the legacy of Tift College — a Baptist women’s college in Forsyth that merged with Mercer in 1986 — through the Tift College Scholars Program. The program honors a select group of young women at Mercer with scholarships and inclusion in one of the University’s most distinguished scholastic organizations. A committee of Tift College alumnae interviews and selects the scholars from applicants who meet the University’s high academic standards. A Tift Scholar is known for her intellect, leadership abilities, values, commitment and dedication to the service of others. A Tift Scholar is awarded a bronze medallion, signifying her selection and participation in the program. Tift Scholars are an important part of the enduring legacy that began at Tift College more than 170 years ago.

■ International Programs

The Office of International Programs (OIP) advances global educational opportunities that inspire purposeful learning and engage Mercerians in communities worldwide. The department supports all forms of study abroad, provides services for international students, visiting scholars and

guests, and manages international relationships and planning for safety and security abroad.

The English Language Institute, part of the OIP, provides linguistic development and cultural exploration for international visitors and non-native English speaking community members in the English Language Institute. The OIP serves all campuses of the University.



■ Mercer On Mission

Mercer On Mission offers transformational experiences for Mercer students through participation in high-impact, international service-learning opportunities. The five-week summer program, designed for undergraduate students, includes two weeks of study on the Macon



campus and three weeks of service abroad. In 2020, Mercer On Mission teams were scheduled for programs in China, the Dominican Republic, Georgia, Greece, Guyana, Honduras, India, Israel, Malawi, Nepal, Rwanda, South Africa, South Korea, Tanzania and Vietnam. They were canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Mercer On Mission anticipates a similar summer schedule for 2021.

■ ROTC

The Mercer University ROTC unit was activated in 1947. Today, the program commissions officers into any of 16 basic U.S. Army branches and into the active Army, U.S. Army Reserve and Army National Guard. The military science classes, associated activities and the ROTC basic courses are open to all students as electives without obligation or can be taken as a minor under most College of Liberal Arts and Sciences majors for four years. The courses aim to develop leadership and managerial potential, provide

an understanding of the requirements and organization for national security and instill a strong sense of personal integrity and individual responsibility.



■ Mercer Medicine

Mercer Medicine is a primary care facility with specialty providers and services offered in-house through offices in Macon, Plains, Peach County and Clay County that serve patients throughout Central and South Georgia.



Primary care providers guide patients through their health journey and create strong, long-term relationships. This personalized care reflects Mercer Medicine's mission to provide compassionate and comprehensive care for each of its patients. If a medical issue arises that requires the attention of a specialist, primary care providers can send patients to one of several in-house departments, including cardiology, endocrinology, infectious disease, psychology and mental health, pulmonology and sports medicine.

■ The Executive Forum

Established in 1979, The Executive Forum, presented by Truist, is Georgia's premier business enrichment program. An outreach program of the Stetson-Hatcher School of Business and the Office of University Advancement, the Forum is a



resource for working professionals in Macon and Atlanta. The Forum provides an opportunity for its membership of more than 200 businesses, corporations, professional organizations and individuals to hear from some of the country's most sought-after speakers while networking with other business professionals. Past speakers include John Kasich, Tom Ridge, Nancy Grace, Mara Liasson, Frank Luntz, Herman Cain, Anderson Cooper, Bob Dole, George Tenet, Bob Woodward,

Juan Williams, Newt Gingrich, Dick Vitale, George Bodenheimer and Steve Forbes.

■ Mercer Engineering Research Center

Mercer Engineering Research Center (MERC) is the nonprofit applied research operating unit of Mercer University. Located in Warner Robins, MERC was established in 1987 to provide engineering and scientific services, research and specialized technical expertise to Robins Air Force Base, other Department of Defense entities



and commercial customers. MERC’s core competencies include electrical engineering, electronic warfare, test and evaluation, embedded software, custom software development, cybersecurity, computational fluid dynamics, human factors and biomechanics, finite element analysis, structural integrity, mechanical testing, non-destructive inspection, reverse engineering and prototyping. MERC employs interns who work closely with MERC engineers and scientists in a broad range of areas supporting the execution of contracts. This opportunity allows students to obtain hands-on experience, adding depth to their education while gaining a better understanding of expertise provided to customers in solving real-world problems.



■ The Grand Opera House

The Grand Opera House, a performing arts center of Mercer University, is a historic, 1,000-seat theater located in downtown Macon. The Grand Opera House is Central Georgia’s sole presenter of professional touring Broadway performances. In addition to the Broadway Series, classic Film Series and the GrandKids Arts Education Series that serves thousands of elementary,



middle and high school students each year, The Grand presents concerts, comedy and dance, and hosts a variety of special events and performances. It is also the performance home of the Nutcracker of Middle Georgia and the Macon Civic Club Revue. In 2017, The Grand underwent part one of a massive renovation including new carpet, an enlarged loading dock and new seating. The second part of the renovation was completed in 2018 and included a completely refurbished and expanded lobby area with two bars, enlarged restrooms and redesigned patron flow. These changes have improved patron experience and allow The Grand to continue to be a vibrant community gathering place for Central Georgians.

■ Mercer Music at Capricorn

Mercer Music at Capricorn is a 20,000-square-foot complex including the historic Capricorn Sound Studios located in downtown Macon. The complex features state-of-the-art commercial studios and production rooms for recording; a museum that tells the Capricorn story through digital, visual and audio storytelling; a music incubator where musicians can rehearse, collaborate and grow; and offices, co-working space and meeting rooms for nonprofits and creatives. A thriving recording studio in the 1960s and 1970s, Capricorn fell into disrepair and languished for years. In 2020, it reopened as Mercer Music at Capricorn after a major renovation that transformed the space while maintaining the integrity of the original studio, remembered today as the birthplace of Southern rock. Mercer Music at Capricorn now plays an integral role in building Macon's music scene and serves as a popular tourist destination in Central Georgia. It is an affiliate of the GRAMMY® Museum in Los Angeles.



■ The McEachern Art Center

Mercer University's McEachern Art Center, known as the MAC, seeks to advance emerging artists and offer the



Central Georgia community a place to contemplate art with care in a restored Art Deco building in downtown Macon. The exhibitions prioritize contemporary art and include free open programming and admission. Ample studio space allows students, faculty and visiting artists a place to create and showcase all in one building. The MAC aims to be the “front porch” of Mercer University downtown as a space for reflection, conversation and connection over arts and culture.

■ Mercer University Press

Mercer University Press has published more than 1,600 books since its establishment in 1979. It publishes approximately 30 to 35 new books each year in the areas of religion, philosophy, Southern history, regional studies, and creative writing. The Press holds membership in the Association of University Presses.



■ University Center

The 230,000-square-foot University Center (UC) serves as the focal point of activity for students, faculty and staff on the Macon campus. Along with housing a full schedule of activities from varsity and intramural sports to wellness and recreation programs, the UC also serves as a place for social gatherings.

A major feature of the building is the 3,200-seat Hawkins Arena, home of the Mercer Bears basketball and volleyball teams. Facilities include a fitness center, varsity athletic team rooms, athletic offices, Griffin B. Bell Board Room, Presidents Dining Room and Heritage Hall. The UC is also a great place to grab a meal or quick snack at The Farmers Market or the food court, featuring P.O.D. Express (Provisions on Demand), Panda Express and a full-service Chick-fil-A.

The Mercer Wellness Program at the UC offers fitness classes for all ability levels. Students, faculty and staff combine fitness and fun with cardio kickboxing, spin bike, yoga, aerobics, weight training and martial arts. An indoor

track overlooks three intramural courts, and the well-equipped fitness center overlooks the indoor lap pool, where students can enjoy a swim or take an aqua aerobics class.



■ University Athletics

Mercer University is the only NCAA Division I private institution in Georgia and competes in the historic Southern Conference (SoCon). In the 2019-2020 academic year, 83 percent of Mercer student-athletes achieved a GPA of 3.0 or better. The average GPA for all student-athletes for the year was 3.514. Mercer athletes led the SoCon with 341 named to the Academic Honor Roll, including 41 who earned a 4.0 GPA. Mercer's 18 intercollegiate teams include men's baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer and tennis; and women's basketball, cross country, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, tennis, beach volleyball, track and volleyball. Other members of the Southern Conference include: the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, East Tennessee State University, Furman University, University of North Carolina at Greensboro, Samford University, The Citadel, Virginia Military Institute, Western Carolina University and Wofford College.



■ Alumni

Some 83,000 Mercer alumni, including graduates of Tift College, live in all 50 states and in 90 countries. The Mercer University Alumni Association, governed by a National Board of Directors and an Alumni Board of Directors for each college and school, seeks to promote the commitment of alumni to the University. The Association sponsors events each year, including Homecoming on the Macon campus and "Mercer Mingles" in cities where alumni live. A network of 49 local alumni chapters helps Mercerians stay connected in their hometowns.

■ Educational Partnership

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE — In 1983, the Warner Robins Air Logistics Complex (the largest entity housed at Robins Air Force Base) and Mercer began discussions about the critical need for engineers at the Base. As a result, the University established the School of Engineering in 1985 and Mercer Engineering Research Center in 1987. The educational partnership was formally renewed in 2018 and now includes additional Mercer academic units and programs including the School of Business, College of Professional Advancement and the Departments of Chemistry and Computer Science in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.
